What legislation pertains to the way SDAA licenses Dental Assistants?

- Labour Mobility and Fair Registrations Practices Act, 2022
- The Miscellaneous Statues (Health Professions) Amendment Act, 2022
- Dental Disciplines Act, 1997

Which jurisdictions in Canada have regulated Dental Assistants?

- Dental Assistants are regulated in the following provinces:
 - British Columbia
 - Alberta
 - Saskatchewan
 - Manitoba
 - New Brunswick
 - ▶ Nova Scotia
 - ▶ PEI
 - Newfoundland

What is Self-Regulation?



- ▶ Self –regulation is:
- ▶ The ability to protect the public interest by setting standards of competency and conduct, and disciplines members that fail to meet them. Self-regulating professions have the right and responsibility to license and discipline members.

What is Self-Regulation? (cont'd)



- Independent of other regulated professions
- For example SDAA only focuses on regulating dental assisting in Saskatchewan; we do not report through the College of Dental Surgeons
- There are only two self-regulating dental assisting jurisidations in Canada – Alberta and Saskatchewan
- All other regulated dental assisting jurisdictions fall under the Colleges of Dentistry in their respective provinces

Are there any unregulated dental assisting jurisdictions in Canada?

- Yes!
- Unregulated dental assisting jurisdictions in Canada:
- Ontario
- Quebec
- Yukon
- Northwest Territories
- Nunavit

How is licensing in an unregulated jurisdiction different from licensing in a regulated jurisdiction like Saskatchewan?

- ▶ Dental assistants practicing in unregulated jurisdictions do not need to:
 - Complete an accredited dental assisting program
 - Successfully pass a national board exam (NDAEB exam)
 - Meet minimum annual educational standards so they remain current in their profession

What is it like being registered in another Canadian province where Dental Assisting is regulated?

- British Columbia regulated (not self-regulated)
- Must meet established requirements in order to renew
- Must purchase liability insurance separately from license

What is a Membership Organization (an Association)?

An association represents its members, to serve the interests of the members.

An association gets its authority and direction from its membership
